Cai Guo-Qiang: There and Back Again at the Yokohama Museum of Art Exhibition opens July 11th, 2015

The Yokohama Museum of Art is proud to present the major solo exhibition *Cai Guo-Qiang: There and Back Again* of the New York based Chinese-born artist. The exhibition will be open from July 11 to October 18, 2015 and will include both originally commissioned works such as *Nighttime Sakura*, the artist's largest-scale gunpowder drawing to date, as well as signature works such as *Head On* and *Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter*. This will be the artist's first solo exhibition in Japan in the last seven years.

The exhibition title *There and Back Again* is derived from a famous poem by Tao Yuanming(365-427) entitled "The Return" Tao Yuanming was an influential Chinese poet who lived during the Six Dynasties period. For this exhibition, Cai chose to reference this piece in which the poet expresses his decision to resign from his official post and return home to live in isolation in the countryside. As a flourishing artist who has migrated from Quanzhou to Japan and then to New York, Cai returns to show his work in Japan, where he first mastered his creative technique. In *There and Back Again*, Cai returns to the roots of his creative method and asks fundamental questions that have marked his own artistic journey. The exhibition also asks the viewers to consider one artist's tireless search for an individual language of expression.

For this exhibition, Cai will create a new work based on his research conducted in Yokohama and the surrounding regions. During this process, Cai has investigated the local history and significant cultural figures such as Okakura Tenshin. Both Okakura, a philosopher born in Yokohama, and Cai have cultural affiliations with China, Japan and the United States. This exhibition will inspire a reflection on the artist's own position at cultural crossroads.

Using this unique perspective, Cai will collaborate with students of various art colleges and local volunteers to create his largest ever gunpowder drawing, *Nighttime Sakura*. For this new drawing on Japanese paper—a medium that Cai has been experimenting with for more than two decades—he will explore the motif of the cherry blossom and its importance in Japanese popular culture. In addition, he will create gunpowder drawings on canvas that posit an inquiry into the different phases and cycles of life. The creative process of these drawings will be open to the media.

For Cai Guo-Qiang: There and Back Again, the artist will also create the collaborative installation Japanese Vine (tentative title). He invited fine art students from the Yokohama College of Art and Design to participate in the creation of several hundred Japanese morning glories modeled in clay. Together they will comprise an elegant installation that

will be suspended from the ceiling and evoke the growing tendrils of a living vine.

In addition to works made especially for this exhibition at the Yokohama Museum of Art, several of Cai's seminal works will also be shown. The visually staggering *Head On* (2006), an installation featuring 99 wolves crashing into a glass wall, will be exhibited for the first time in Japan. A suite of four gunpowder drawings on porcelain, each measuring 3m long by 2.4m wide, *Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter* (2014) follows the cycle of the four seasons, evoking and renewing the spirit and tradition of Chinese literati ink painting. Delicately balancing the violent, instant impact of the gunpowder explosion and the fragility of the porcelain, Cai Guo-Qiang manages to capture the vivid tones of the four seasons with unusual nuance and sensitivity.

Cai Guo-Qiang's work asks viewers to reflect upon the coexistence of humans and nature within this complex society.

During the creative process of the exhibition, Cai is collaborating with Eishi Katsura Studio from the Graduate School of Film and New Media of Tokyo University of Arts | geidaiRAM to produce a documentary video about both the research and the creation of the new gunpowder works that will be exhibited alongside the artworks.

The exhibition will also mark the launch of Art Island, an online art and educational game platform first conceived by the artist with the support of UNESCO. Art Island (2015) is targeted for children aged 6 to 9 that Cai has initiated with the long-term goal of fostering creativity, mutual understanding and peace in the East Asian region. The game will be launched on the occasion of this exhibition and will be made available on tables installed in the foyer of the exhibition galleries of Yokohama Museum of Art. Children will be able to create, collaborate and exchange ideas within the game's virtual workshops. The Fireworks Workshop and Robot Workshop in particular are based on Cai's signature artistic approach and are inspired by his 2010-2013 travelling exhibition *Cai Guo-Qiang: Peasant Vincis*. As the game continues to develop, prominent artists, designers and architects from East Asia will be invited to create additional workshops for Art Island.

The exhibition is accompanied by a catalog, which includes images of the creation process and installation views of the exhibition as well as a Japanese version of the *Ninety-nine Tales: Curious Stories from My Journey through the Real and Unseen Worlds.* Written by Cai, these stories narrate the events surrounding his personal growth. The catalog will be on sale as of late July at the museum shop, general bookstores and online shops in Japan.

Other exhibitions featuring Cai Guo-Qiang in Japan beginning July 2015

During the summer of 2015, Cai Guo-Qiang's work will be featured in three exhibitions across Japan. Cai will participate in the Echigo-Tsumari Art Triennial 2015 with an exhibition at the Satoyama Museum of Contemporary Art Kinare scheduled to open on July 26th. Before that, on July 25th, he will collaborate with local people to make gunpowder drawings on site. On July 26th, an exhibition of Peter Hutchison's work curated by Cai will open at his Dragon Museum of Contemporary Art (DMOCA) in Echigo-Tsumari. Opening on July 27th, a solo exhibition featuring a selection of small-scale gunpowder drawings will be on view at Art Front Gallery, Daikanyama, Tokyo. The opening, scheduled for 6pm, will be followed by an artist talk at 7pm the same evening. Funds raised by the artwork sales will be donated to a charitable cause.

This summer will be an incredibly unique season for us to experience the world of Cai Guo-Qiang's art and consider his return to Japan, where the artist made his debut as a visual artist.

About the artist

Cai Guo-Qiang (b. 1957, Quanzhou, Fujian Province, China).

He was trained in stage design at the Shanghai Theater Academy, and his work has since crossed multiple mediums within art, including drawing, installation, video and performance. While living in Japan from 1986 to 1995, he explored the properties of gunpowder in his drawings, an inquiry that eventually led to the development of his signature explosion events. Cai was awarded the Golden Lion at the 48th Venice Biennale in 1999, and the 20th Fukuoka Asian Culture Prize in 2009, and the Praemium Imperiale in 2012. Additionally, he was also among the five artists honored with the first U.S. Department of State Medal of Arts award. He also served as Director of Visual and Special Effects for the Opening and Closing Ceremonies of the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing.

Among his many solo exhibitions and projects include *Cai Guo-Qiang on the Roof: Transparent Monument*, Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, 2006 and his retrospective *I Want to Believe*, which opened at the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York in 2008. His firstever solo exhibition in Brazil, *Cai Guo-Qiang: Da Vincis do Povo*, went on a three-city tour around the country in 2013. Traveling from Brasilia to São Paulo before reaching its final destination in Rio de Janeiro, it was the most visited exhibition by a living artist worldwide that year with over one million visitors. In October 2013, Cai created *One Night Stand (Aventure d'un Soir)*, an explosion event for Nuit Blanche, a citywide art and culture festival organized by the city of Paris. In August 2014, his solo exhibition *Cai Guo-Qiang: The Ninth Wave* opened at the Power Station of Art in Shanghai.

His most recent exhibition *Cai Guo-Qiang: Impromptu* opened in December 2014 at Fundación Proa. On January 24, 2015, he realized *Life is a Milonga: Tango Fireworks for Argentina* in the neighborhood of La Boca, Buenos Aires.

He currently lives and works in New York.
